MINUTES MALIBU CITY COUNCIL REGULAR MEETING

APRIL 12, 2021

TELECONFERENCED - VARIOUS LOCATIONS 6:30 P.M.

The following meeting was held pursuant to the Governor's Executive Orders N-25-20 and N-29-20 and fully teleconferenced from various locations during the coronavirus disease (COVID-19) pandemic.

REGULAR SESSION CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Pierson called the meeting to order at 6:31 p.m.

ROLL CALL

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Mayor Pierson led the Pledge of Allegiance.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

MOTION

Mayor Pierson moved, and Councilmember Farrer seconded a motion to approve the agenda, moving Item Nos. 2.B. and 2.C. to the end of the agenda and adjourning in the memory of retired Los Angeles County Sheriff's Deputy Mike Treinen and the four pedestrian fatalities in Malibu during the last month.

FRIENDLY AMENDMENT

Councilmember Silverstein moved to hear Item No. 4.E. before Item No. 4.D.

The amendment was accepted by the maker and the seconder.

The question was called, and the amended motion carried unanimously.

REPORT ON POSTING OF AGENDA

Acting City Clerk Pettijohn reported that the agenda for the meeting was properly posted on April 1, 2021, with the amended agenda posted April 8, 2021.

ITEM 1 CEREMONIAL/PRESENTATIONS

A. <u>City of Malibu 30th Anniversary Commemorative Video Screening</u>

The City of Malibu 30th Anniversary Commemorative Video was presented.

Mayor Pierson thanked the team that created the video and stated beauty mixed with periodic disaster seemed to be the history of Malibu.

B. Update on School District Separation

Mayor Pierson announced the Malibu School Unification Awareness Night on April 14, 2021 to provide the community with information on school district separation and prepare for the Los Angeles County Office of Education (LACOE) preliminary public hearing on the April 17, 2021.

Councilmember Farrer encouraged the public to attend and participate in the Malibu School Unification Awareness Night and the LACOE preliminary public hearing. She presented information on how the preliminary public hearing would be conducted.

Deputy City Attorney Wood presented information on the counteroffer recently received from the Santa Monica-Malibu School District (SM-MUSD) in response to the City's best and final offer in March 2021 and LACOE's role in separation.

The Council discussed the update and directed questions to staff.

C. <u>Proclamation Declaring April 2021 as DMV/Donate Life California Month in</u> Malibu

Mayor Pierson presented the proclamation to Rita Jackson from One Legacy Foundation.

Ms. Jackson thanked the Council for the proclamation. She discussed her daughter's tragic death from a pulmonary embolism and how her legacy continued because she had chosen to be an organ donor.

ITEM 2.A. PUBLIC COMMENTS

Lieutenant Jim Braden expressed his appreciation and gratitude for the sentiment expressed regarding Deputy Mike Trienen's passing. He stated Deputy Treinen was an asset to the community and touched many people's lives in Malibu. He

discussed recent fatal accidents on Pacific Coast Highway (PCH) at Puerco Canyon, Busch Drive, and Corral Canyon. He stated the drivers were not in error and pedestrians had behaved in dangerous manners. He stated deputies were talking to people experiencing homelessness about the dangers of walking on dark roadways. He encouraged residents to report suspicious or hazardous behavior.

Mark Graham stated he lived in Elk Grove, California. He discussed telecommunication bills SB 556 and AB 537. He stated the League of California Cities opposed SB 556 and discussed its letter of opposition. He encouraged the Council to oppose these bills. He stated AB 537 would eliminate local jurisdiction over permitting of cell antennas.

Kraig Hill thanked the Council for denying the permit for offsite parking at the Malibu Inn. He questioned when the City Manager's employment would be settled. He encouraged City Manager Feldman and the Council to settle separation negotiations quickly and identify a new City Manager. He discussed how staff overstepped its authority.

Norman Haynie stated he was saddened by Mike Treinen's passing. He discussed the initial study for the Seaview Hotel project and stated questions had been raised about the water check valve at Topanga. He stated the repair and maintenance of the water check valve at Topanga was not included in the initial study because the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) exempted repair and maintenance of utilities and it would be inappropriate to include it. He requested the Council direct staff to move forward with the existing initial study.

Mark Baute stated he had formed a Malibu Awareness Committee that would advertise factual information to the voters. He expressed concern that it was inappropriate for Planning Commissioners to comment on Closed Session negotiations. He stated there were concerns that Council was not getting to all the projects on the work plan.

Craig Foster declined the opportunity to speak.

Lynn Norton expressed concern Planning staff recommendations did not always align with the Planning Commission's recommendations. She stated Planning staff was not a decision-making body.

ITEM 2.B. COMMISSION / COMMITTEE / CITY MANAGER UPDATES

Brian Merrick provided an update on the Public Works Commission activities. He discussed a joint Public Works Commission and Public Safety Commission meeting to discuss potential fire warning systems for the canyons and the new speed humps on Point Dume. He stated the Public Works Commission would be working on the Civic Center Water Treatment Facility Phase 2 project, adding a right turn lane at Trancas Canyon, PCH warning signs, and the permanent skate park. He stated it was unclear if the Public Works Commission or the Public Safety

Commission had jurisdiction over parking. He indicated support for allowing the Farmers Market to use parking on the Chili Cook-Off lot.

ITEM 3 CONSENT CALENDAR

Recommended Action: After the City attorney reads the title, adopt urgency Ordinance No. 485U adding Chapter 5.70 to the Malibu Municipal Code relating to hazard pay requirements for employees working frontline positions in grocery retail and drug retail establishments in the City of Malibu during the COVID-19 pandemic, finding the same exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act, and declaring the urgency thereof. A four-fifths vote of the City Council is required and, if approved, it will take effect immediately.
